November is known as the month of gratitude. To give thanks, we celebrate Thanksgiving. Many families spend the day eating delicious food with loved ones, but some might not know the history behind the well-loved holiday. It all started in 1621 when a group of people called the Pilgrims, also known as the Plymouth settlers, emigrated to America. After a harsh winter, nearly half of the settlers lost their lives.

We all know the phrase "I scream, you scream, we all scream for ice cream!" Historical figure Fidel Castro was one of many who said that phrase the loudest. Castro was a dairy fanatic: he ate eighteen spoonfuls of ice cream at breakfast, drank many milk shakes, and consumed other dairy products multiple times a day. His obsession with dairy motivated him to open one of the largest ice cream parlors in the world (which is still open to this day). Dairy affected every aspect of Castro's life, from his diplomatic interactions to his assassination attempts. For example, he once argued with a French diplomat over the superiority of Cuban cheese to that of French cheese. What's more, the CIA even tried to poison one of his milkshakes! However, to Castro's horror, the milk production in Cuba was subpar and did not meet his dairy-production expectations. Hence, he ordered a team of scientists to create a new cow breed that would produce increased amounts of milk. This led to multiple failed projects, with one exception: Ubre Blanca. This event is now known as America's "first Thanksgiving." On November 26, 1789, President George Washington issued a proclamation for "a day of public thanksgiving and prayer." Later in 1863, Abraham Lincoln encouraged Americans to recognize the last Thursday of November as a "day of Thanksgiving." In response to this, Congress made Thanksgiving a national holiday in 1870. As you celebrate Thanksgiving this year, remember to be thankful for what you have, and most importantly, give thanks to God who provided you with everything!
